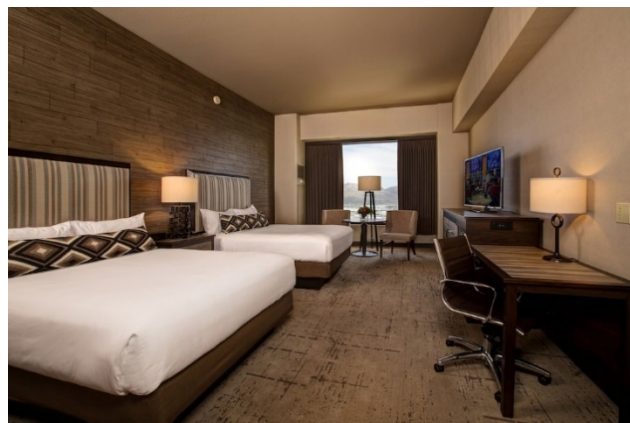

Wait for the Lord, be strong and take heart and wait for the Lord. Psalm 27:14

Winter waiting.... Have you contemplated it this winter? We recently had a BIG snowstorm, a Christmas gift that lasted thru New Year's. Trees snapped and broke, heavy ice caved in roofs and the damage to the electrical infrastructure was as bad as a fire for our mountain village. We survived 10 days on a back up generator, which meant nights without power to save on fuel. So yes, I had time to ponder many things with no TV, internet and other distractions. Thus, I contemplated winter, a season from our Lord.

Winter, a dull time, no activities it seems, a lack of vibrance and life. Then I thought of bulbs, planted in the fall, lying dormant and often forgotten underground. Yet they are growing roots and preparing for growth above the ground. Trees lose their leaves to protect against cold damage and prepare themselves for new buds, flowers, and fruit. Without winter, there is no spring. Humm, if winter waiting is so vital and beneficial then why do I wrestle with it?

I wonder what our mites are doing this "winter"? Are they growing underground and just have not surfaced? Our goal for this biennium is \$124,000 to fund 22 grants. As of the end of December the mites total \$93,746, and we have funded 14 grants.

My *winter waiting* prayer is "Wait for the Lord, be strong and take heart and wait for the Lord." Ps 27:14. Take heart ladies, wait and pray with me for our grants to be funded by the end of March 2022.

Update on Grant #13

Support for Lutheran Family Services: Jacmel Lutheran Home for the Elderly - Haiti

In January 2019, our elder home facility opened, and ten residents moved into Jacmel Lutheran Home. Our elders receive regular meals and round-the-clock medical care. We provide far more than standard of care at Jacmel Lutheran Home. Our Nurse Director is a nursing school graduate and we have a skilled physician that gives each resident a physical exam as they enter the home and prescribes medicine accordingly in addition we provide our elders spiritual care. They participate in daily devotions and attend a weekly church service. The elders have also formed their own choir.

Shortly after Haiti closed its borders in March 2020 because of the COVID-19 pandemic, the Jacmel Lutheran Home was in lockdown. For eight weeks, the nursing director stayed on-site with carefully prepared meals, medications, and other supplies delivered in a safe manner. The precautions worked - we had no cases. To date, only three residents have passed away. It is nothing short of miraculous, given the condition the elders were in when they were admitted.

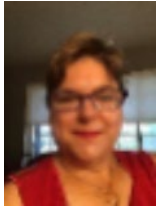
When talking among themselves our elders sometimes reminisce about their families and former life. They have all agreed they are each other's family now. Ministry in Mission is thankful, grateful and blessed for this unique opportunity to serve. We couldn't accomplish what we do without the generous partnership of the California-Nevada-Hawaii Lutheran Women's Missionary League.

As the pandemic looms on, things may seem to grow dim at times, but as Christians, we know that we can trust in our Lord and Savior at all times. As a result, we can live joyfully in the knowledge we are indeed, growing in Christ, through each and every trial that comes our way.

As the Convention in Sparks approaches, the Special Focus Ministries Committee has been joyfully looking forward to, and planning for the ingatherings and other events.

Lori Fisher is in the process of confirming two shelters for our ingathering: Do Drop Inn and Austin's House. We will be collecting gift cards in \$10.00 increments for Walmart and Grocery Outlet, Starbucks and In and Out. The Starbucks & In and Out gift cards will be given to Austin's House for their group outings. We are also going to put together hygiene kits for Mercy Holistic Ministry's Shower Ministry for the homeless in the Sacramento area. Steve Magee is going to secure a grant from Orphan Grain Train to cover the cost of towels and wash cloths to wrap the toiletries along with a small nap-sac to carry their items.

We will also be marking Bibles for prisoners at the Convention. Lori Fisher has confirmed with one prison and is in the process of confirming with another. Cathey King is order supplies to put Bible marking supply packs together. There should be approximately fifty Bibles and supply packs available at the Convention.

Rose and Ed, from The Lutheran Braille Workers, will be coming Thursday night before the Convention, in order to set up and lead their event from 12 PM-5 PM on Friday. Their room will be paid for, Thursday and Friday night. They will need to register for the Convention for communion purposes.

At the Convention, The Special Focus Ministries Committee will have two display tables: one will have room for the Heart to Heart — Sisters of All Nations, Young Women and Human Care Committees, and the other will be set up for the two shelters.

Thank you for allowing me to serve as VP of Special Focus Ministries.

WE HAVE A PLANE! I am very excited to report we have access to a plane and shipping for our items which will go to Tonga. I am even more excited to announce the plane is being provided through the office of California State Senator Josh

Becker. Mele and Jesse were on a conference call with a liaison for this project and we were able to secure room for 20 pallets of supplies. The plane will be able to accommodate up to 158 pallets of supplies. What this means for us is that **all of our donations** are about TWICE as valuable because we are not paying for shipping.

As I write this, we have over \$6,000 which has been donated for Tongan Relief. I have heard additional people are planning to donate. In summary, we already have funds to provide 20 pallets of water. At the same time, pallets of rice, flour, and other items are more expensive. Since we have reserved 20 pallets worth of space, we can increase our gift even if we do not get any additional space. The people working on this project are soliciting corporations to fill out the remaining space.

Finally, if the community fills the plane, we have been assured there will be a second plane in 30-60 days to send another load of supplies. It is wonderful to have this opportunity and we are grateful for the partnership which is happening to help the people of Tonga.

It was just a normal winter virus but coming right after our nice visit with family and lasting 2 weeks had left me feeling lousy like the illness would never end. Add to that the general mood in the world due to the increase in the COVID 19 Omicron variant and other bad news and BOOM! I was dragging low.

The song "Rattle!" by Elevation worship was playing on the radio. When I heard the words of the song "since when has impossible ever stopped You?". I suddenly thought this is so true. Nothing can stop God! As the song went on it told of the miracles that God has done that are told in the Bible, raising people from the dead, healing people, feeding large crowds and most importantly the birth, life, death, and resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ!

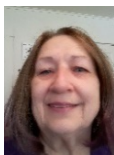
Zone 2 - Concordia

My husband and I then attended a Bible study lead by LWML member, Pam Rapp, about DOORS. It was a wonderful day filled with new friends and fellow Christians sharing God's word and His work through LWML. Thank you to Pam and to Pastor Jeff Morey, who is our Zone 3 Counselor.

Members of **Zion Lutheran Church, Lodi**, LWML /Sewing Circle invited me to attend their January meeting where we discussed what goes into hosting a Rally. They are now enthusiastically planning the Zone 3 March 2022 Spring Rally! What an energetic group of ladies.

They shared with me their NICU blanket project. They make small (about 12") square flannel "blankets", two per family, for babies housed in their local NICU. Baby and mom both sleep with a square then trade blankets, so that they sleep with the square that smells like mom/baby. This is so helpful with bonding when mom and baby cannot be together.



These ladies also make quilts for cancer patients, personalized not only with their name, but also using squares with fabric personal to their interests. The ladies then pray over the blankets, bring the blankets before the congregation for prayer, sign a card for the recipient and then share the finished quilt with members, friends, co-workers, and others dealing with cancer and other debilitating illnesses.

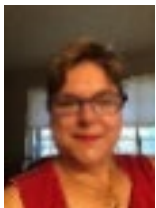

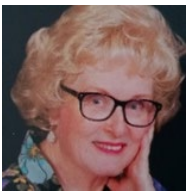
